What Is the International Organization for Standardization (ISO)?

The International Organization for Standardization (ISO) is an international nongovernmental organization made up of national standards bodies; it develops and publishes a wide range of proprietary, industrial, and commercial standards and is comprised of representatives from various national standards organizations.

The organization's abbreviated name—ISO—is not an acronym; it derives from the ancient Greek word *isos*, meaning equal or equivalent. Because the organization would have different acronyms in different languages, the founders of the organization decided to call it by the short form ISO

The use of ISO 9001 quality standard in higher education institution libraries

Quality management has become increasingly present in the life of organizations. Their survival is mainly linked to the quality of their activities. The way in which each organization focuses on quality issues may vary according to the sectors and the environment where it carries out its activities and of course, the organization's own strategies. There are various ways of focusing on quality and one of the options is to approach the quality management system using the standard ISO 9001.

According to Arora (2009), library is the 'heart' of the academic setup. Tayabas (1983) talked the same language as Arora. She mentioned that " .. the library at the center stage vis-a-vis the functions of the university: teaching, research and extension. To all these functions, the library and its services must be responsive. No academic development will occur out of teaching, research, and extension, whether collectively or individually, without the all-important supports of the library." Therefore, the library's role is very important and to be a good library in terms of efficiently resources management. It is highly recommended to control their quality of services.

Did You Know?

The **place of publication** is an important data for the identification of a continuing resource. **The publisher should always mention the place of publication** on the journal or magazine itself and in the associated metadata when available.

When the country of publication for a continuing resource changes, the responsibility for the assignment of ISSN and for updating the related metadata **is transferred from the initial ISSN National Centre to the one in the new country of publication.**

For publications issued in countries where there is no ISSN National Centre, the ISSN International Centre is responsible for ISSN assignment. It is also responsible for the identification of publications issued by the international organizations.

There are specific agreements within the ISSN Network regarding multinational publishers whose list is available on Zenodo (<https://zenodo.org/records/8321076>).

HISTORY OF NATIONAL BOOK WEEK

In 1934, the Philippine Library Association handed a petition to then Governor-General Frank Murphy to propose a celebration that promotes literacy and the library's services to the public. In response to the Association, Murphy relented and declared the Philippines' first National Book Week in June of that year. The date of National Book Week was only changed to its current location at the end of November in 1936.

Even though interest in reading is waning in today's world due to teenagers' preference for television and video games, National Book Week organizers claim it is more vital than ever. One of the goals of the holiday is to keep schoolchildren's reading habits alive so that future generations will be able to express themselves in writing.

Essay competitions, book exhibitions, and other types of fun competitions are held by a variety of libraries and educational institutions to encourage increased public engagement. To emphasize the value of reading to young minds, the government encouraged schools to arrange trips to libraries and publishers. National Book Week drew even more attention as the Catholic Church began to actively participate in its commemoration, with priests being encouraged to offer sermons emphasizing the importance of reading books. During National Book Week in the Philippines, this tradition is still practiced.

National Book Week has been welcomed with great enthusiasm by the Filipino public since its inception, generating widespread public interest and receiving support from senior government officials. It has sparked a renewed interest in reading in the Philippines, as well as increased library visits. While it can't be blamed on the week, the Philippines has one of Asia's highest literacy rates, at 96.3% as of 2020, which may explain why National Book Week is a huge success across the archipelago.

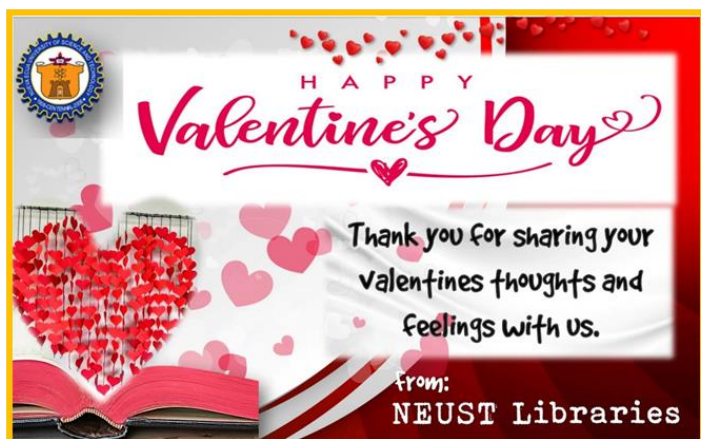

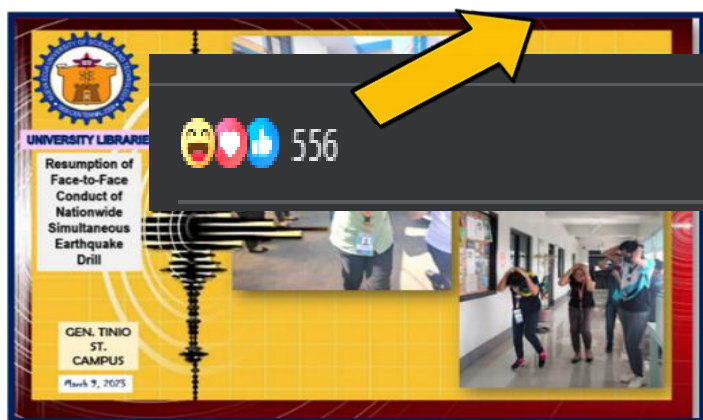

There are some general procedures that everyone in every community should follow, and these should serve as the basic guiding principles of any earthquake emergency response plan:

- Don't panic
- Move away from windows, heavy objects, windows, etc.

Consider the possibility of extending the drill to include families and homes, and discuss the need for developing a family plan since students are likely to be separated from their families after an earthquake. Suggest that the students designate an out-of-area telephone contact and carry it at all times. Students should know how to turn off gas, water, electricity in their homes.

The earthquake response plan and color-coded maps produced by the students should be presented to school authorities and local government administrators. Students should be encouraged to discuss their findings with public figures responsible for public safety. Whenever possible, students should also have the opportunity to frame and display their final map so that other students in the school can know their work.

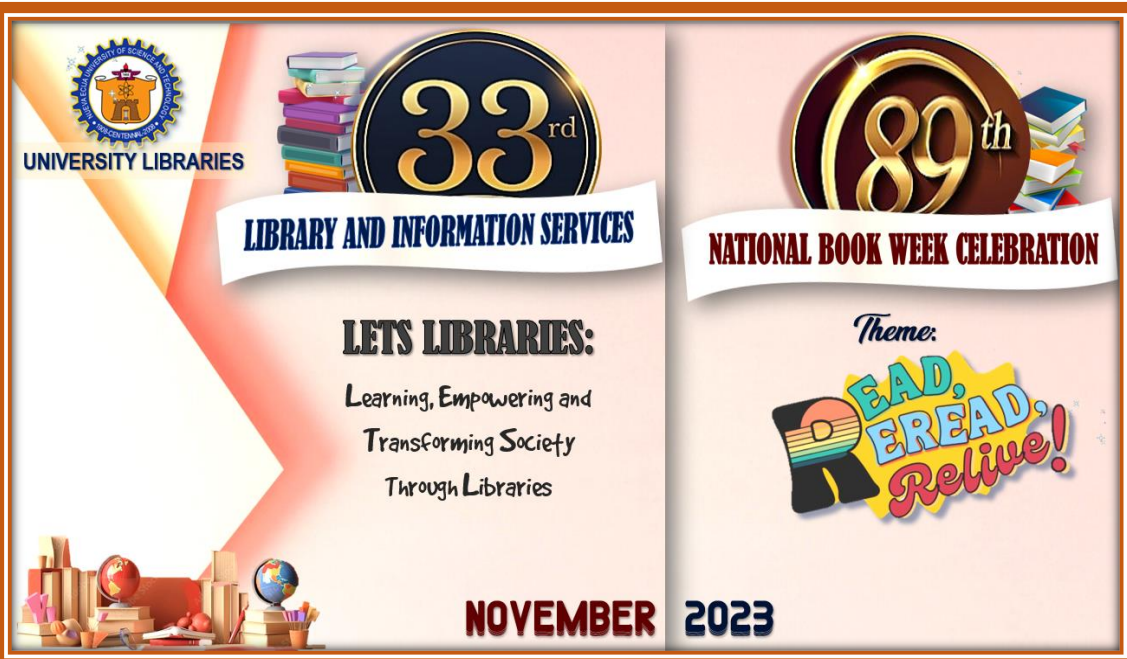

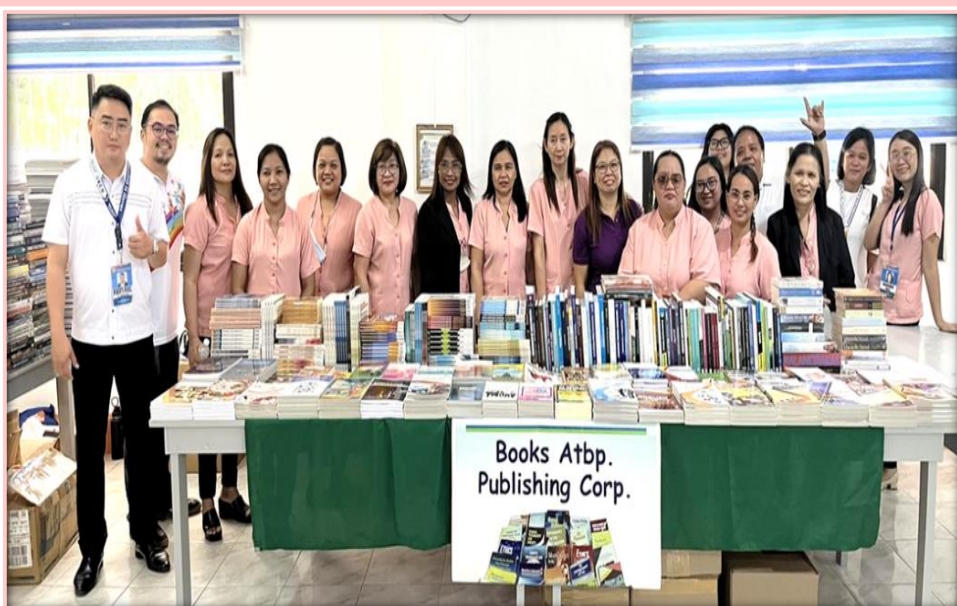


3. Expand School, Classroom, and Home Libraries:

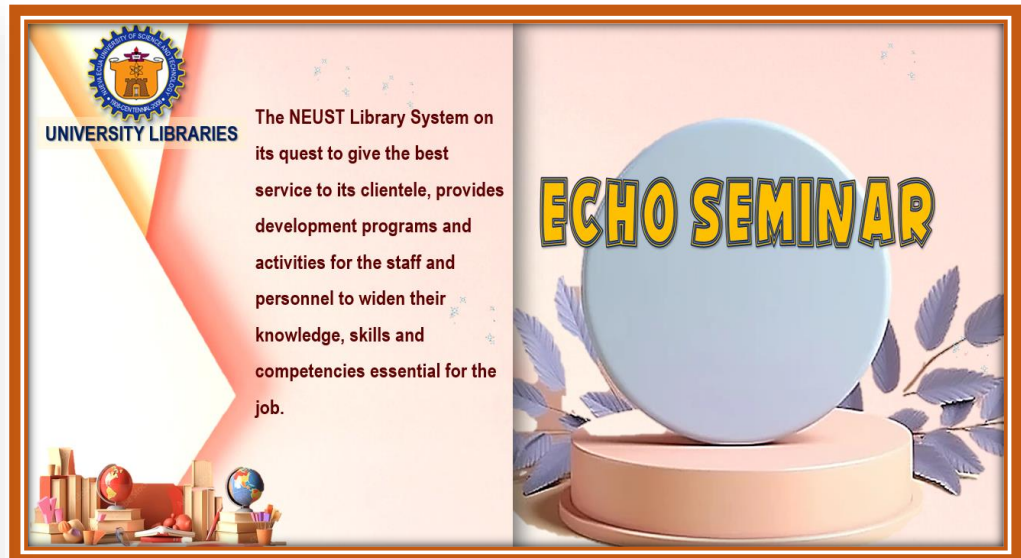
